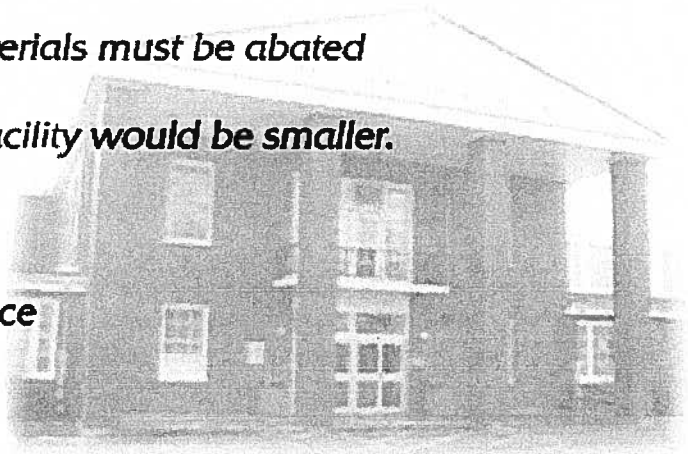


- **Review physical conditions of school buildings and develop cost for renovations.**
- **Document existing building plans. Determine acceptable educational capacity for each building.**
- **Review enrollment projections and determine expansion required at each facility.**
- **Evaluate costs for renovating and expanding individual school facilities.**
- **Evaluate costs of developing new school facilities.**
- **Evaluate potential sites for a new school.**
- **Evaluate advantages / disadvantages of a new school project with specific emphasis on the costs associated with educational opportunities, construction costs, and continued operational costs.**



East Bridgewater High School:

- Age of facility warrants complete comprehensive replacement of all systems
- All asbestos and hazardous materials must be abated
- Inefficient layout. An "All new" facility would be smaller.
- Poor educational layout
- Lack of modern educational space
- Lack of energy efficiency
- Phased construction would be required for renovation
- Extremely poor exterior masonry (Structural) conditions at 1975 addition
- MSBA ranked East Bridgewater HS in the lowest 2% of all facilities in Massachusetts.
- Less expensive, less disruptive, and more educationally sound to construct "All-new" High School than to renovate existing.



Central Elementary School:

- Based on its current size, appropriate educational capacity for Central Elementary School is approximately 400-500 students.
- Current enrollment at Central Elementary School is approximately 850 students.
- **EXTREME overcrowding condition.**
- 1949 building can be saved/renovated and maintain a strong historic presence as part of the Town Center.
- 1965 building should be demolished to allow for a substantial expansion which is functional and educationally productive.

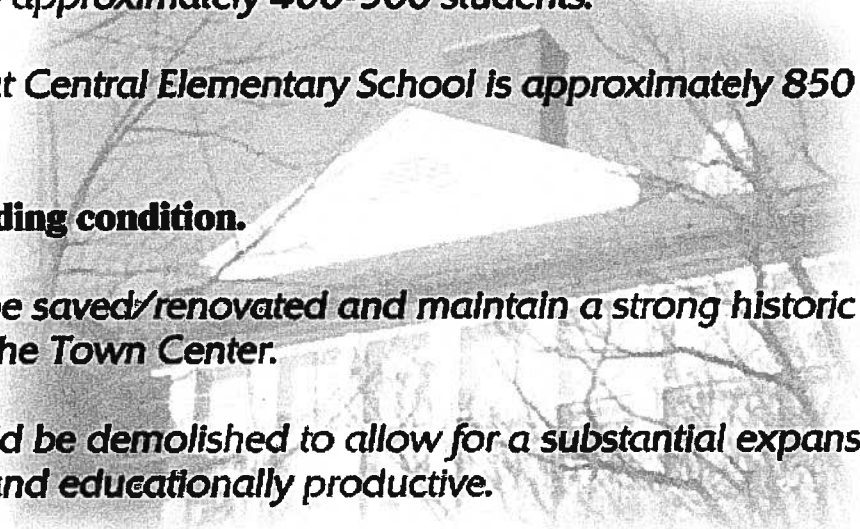

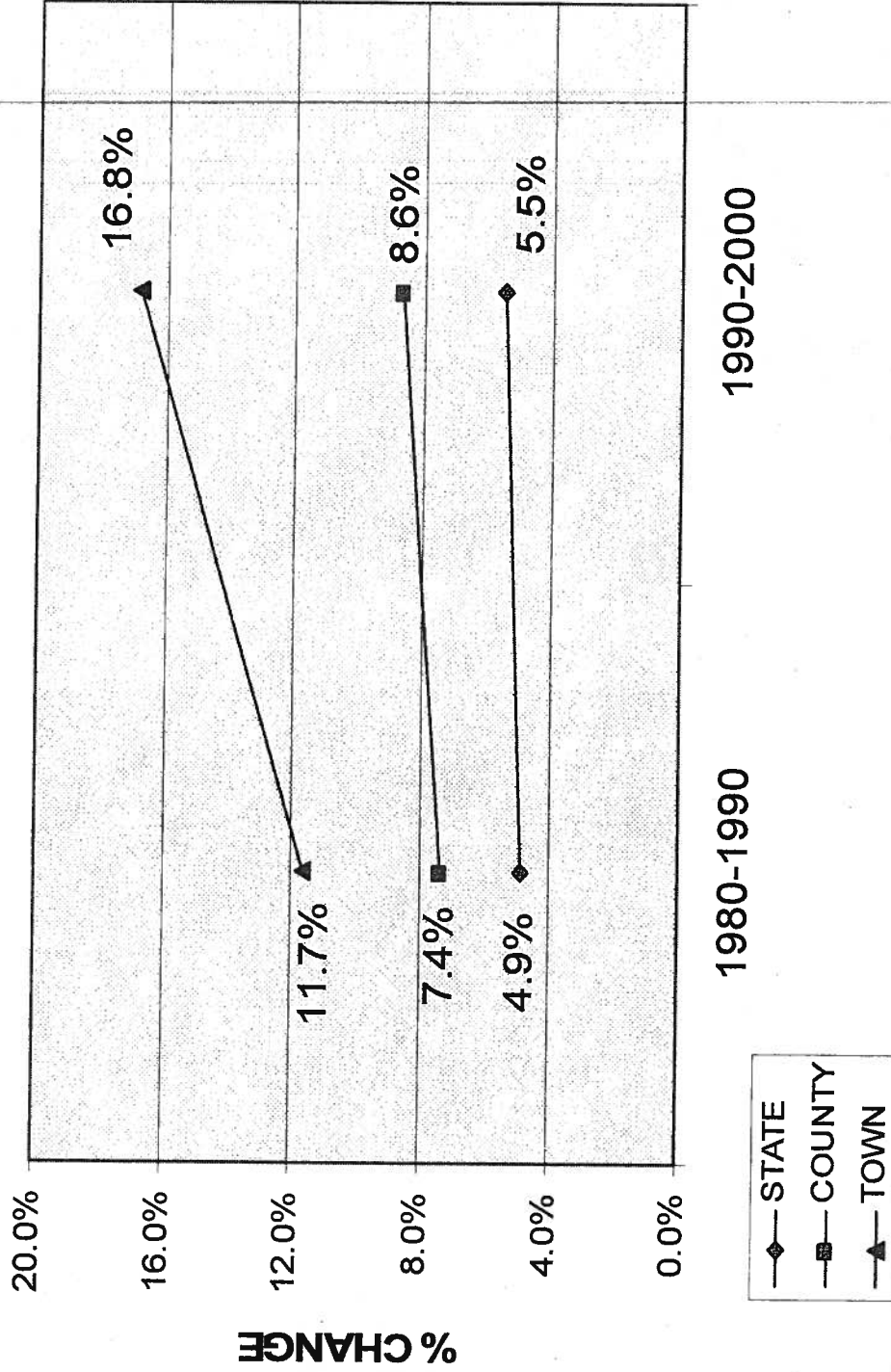

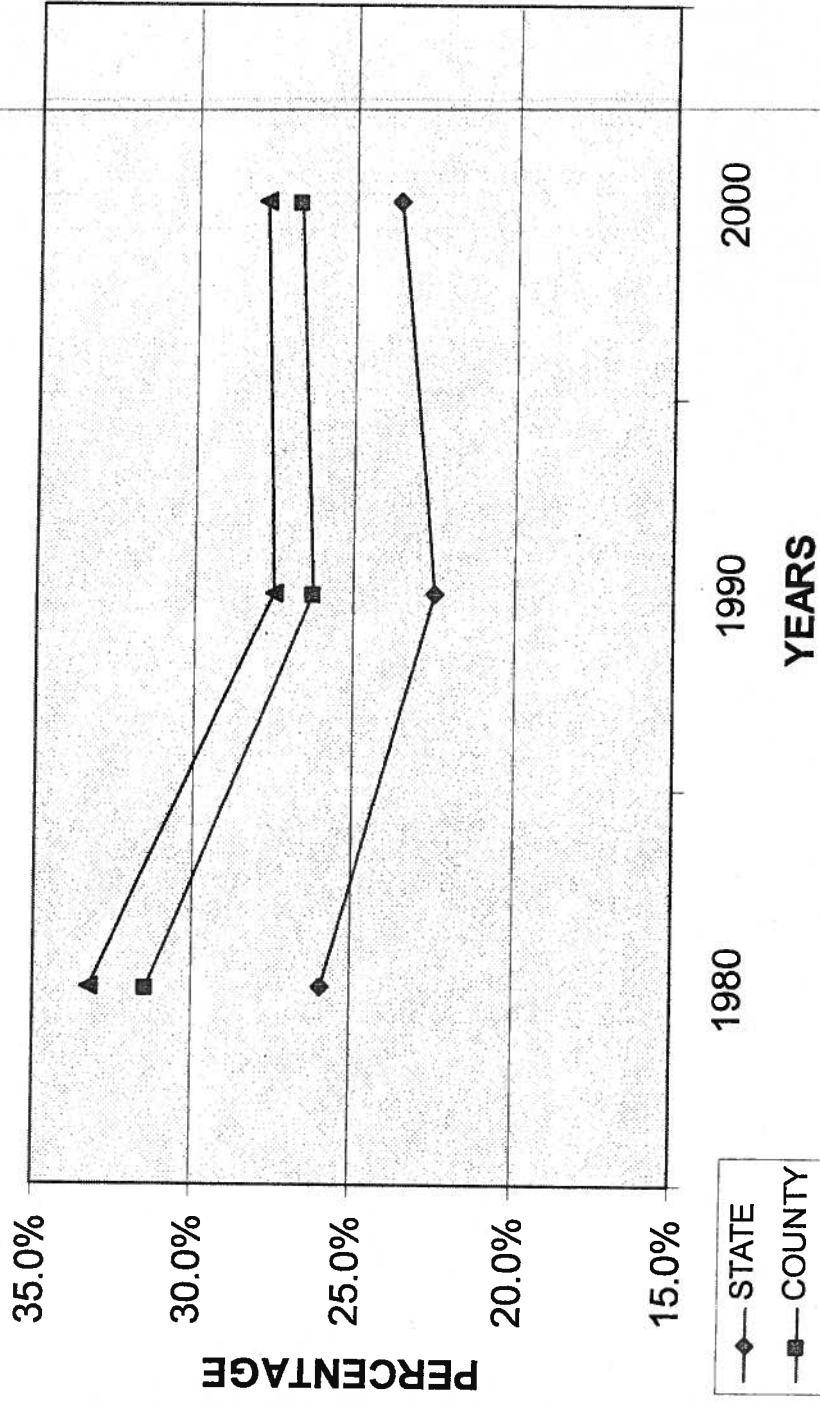

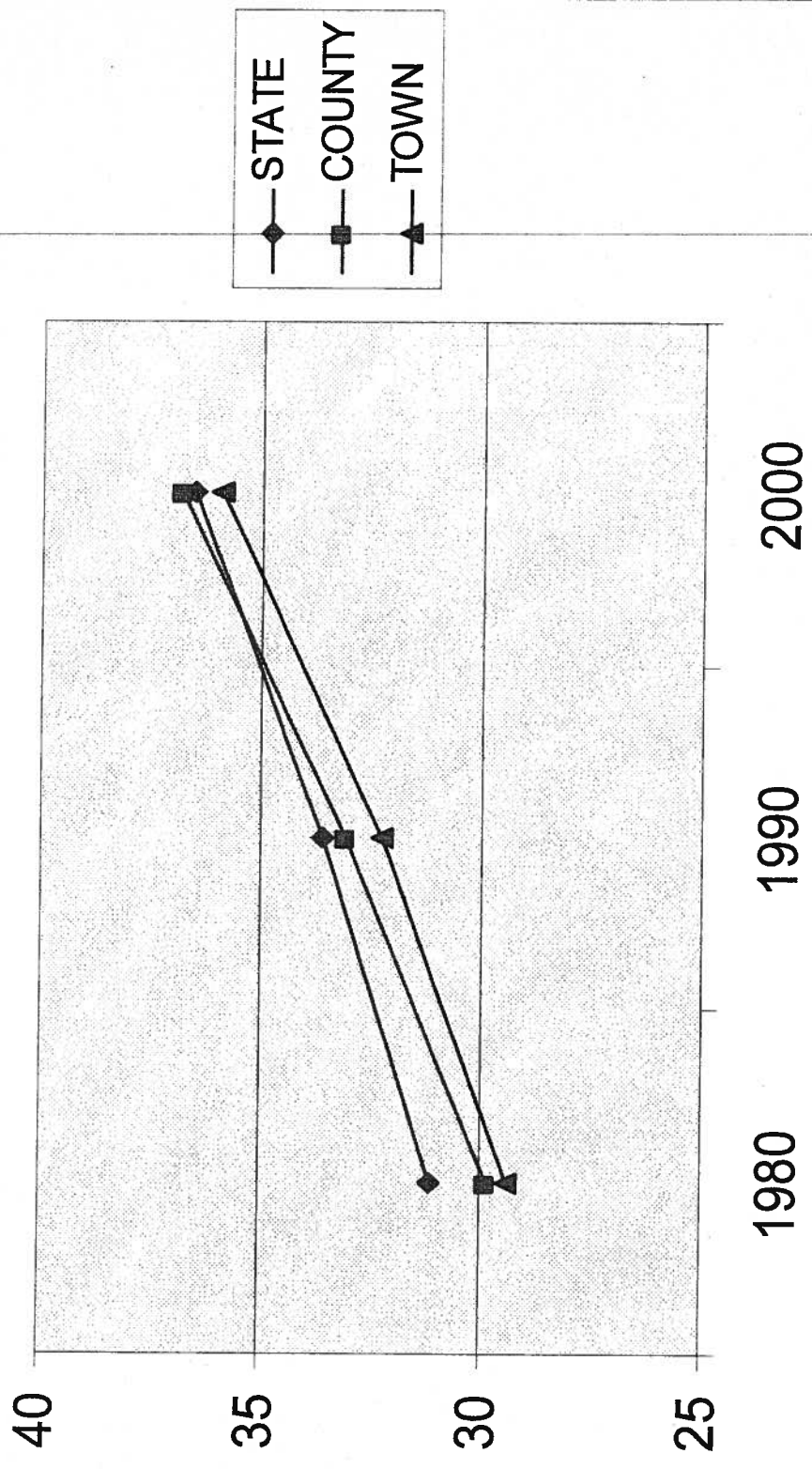

PERCENTAGE K-12 ENROLLMENT IN POPULATION

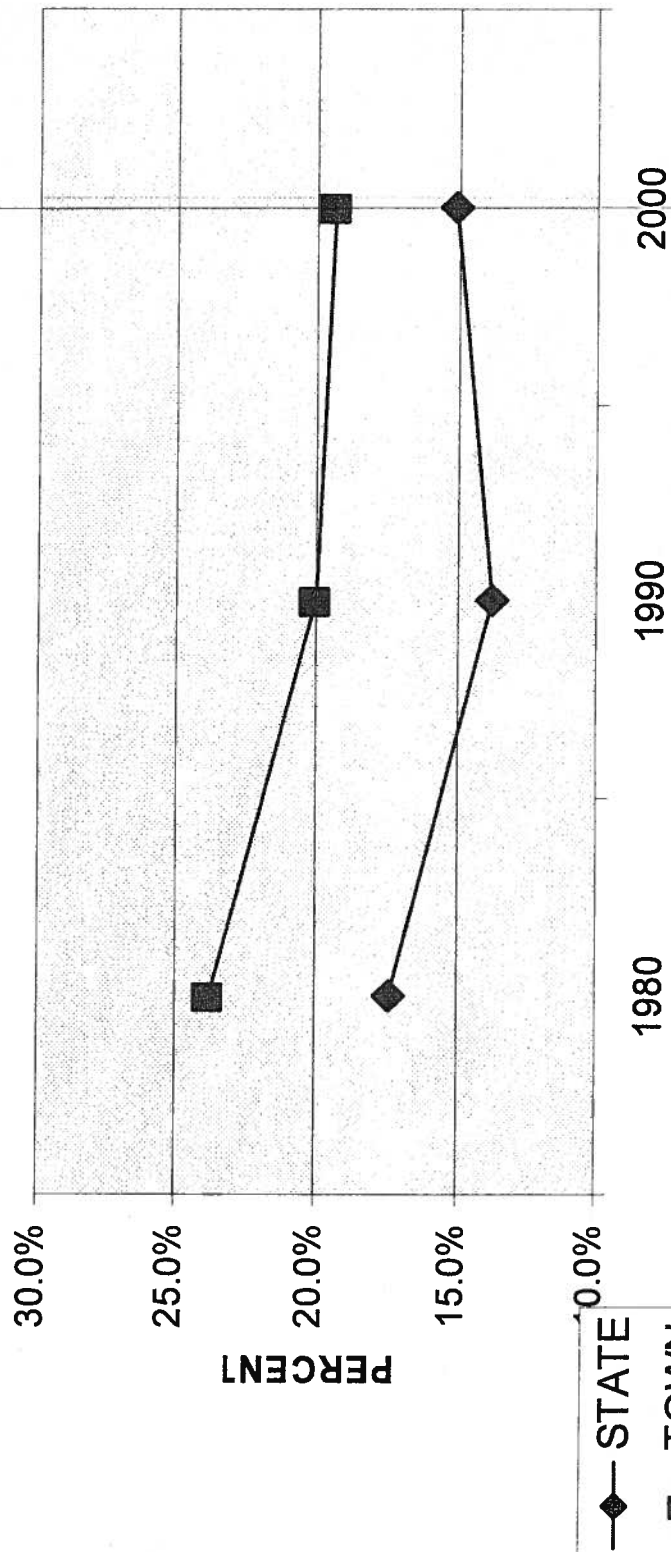

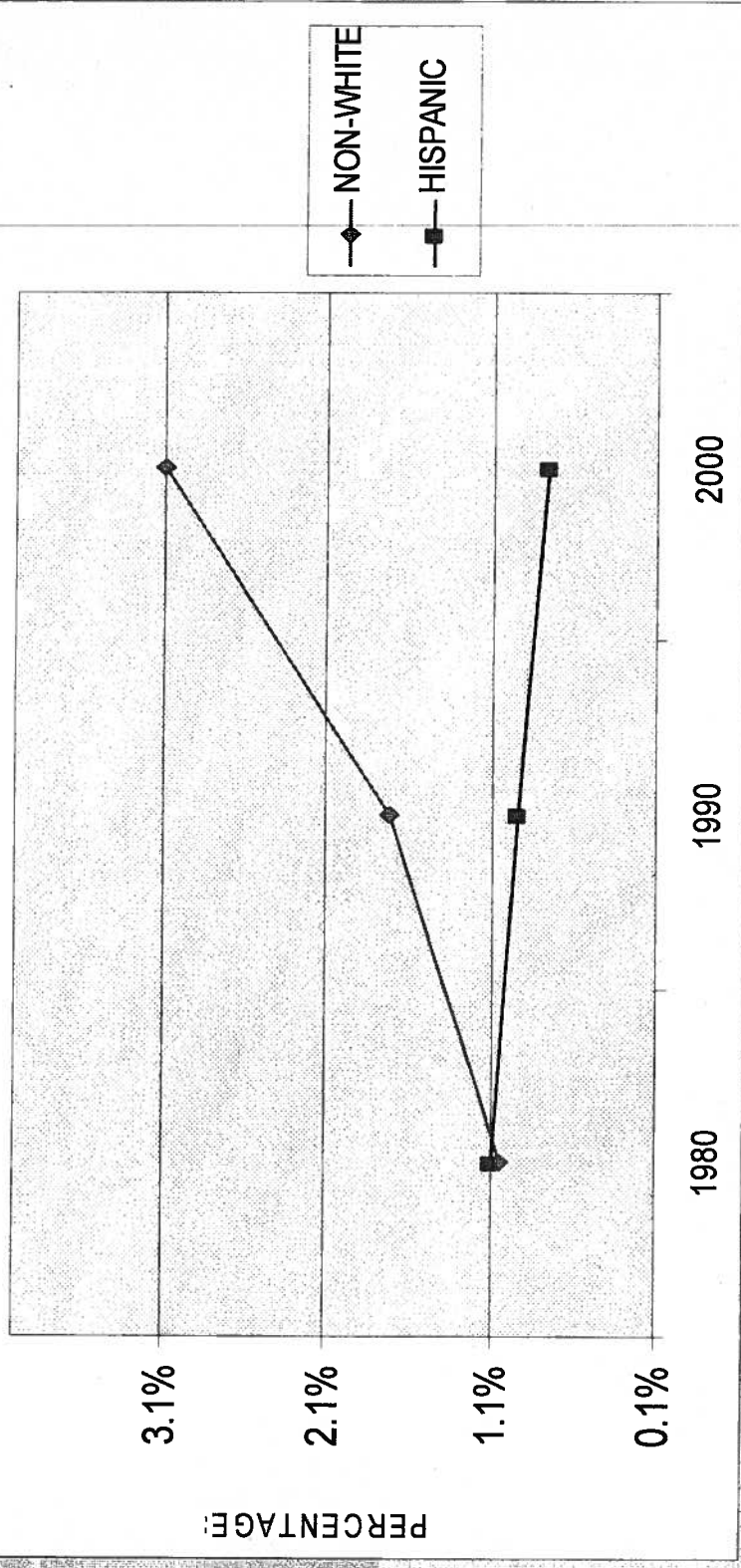

CHANGES IN HOUSING GROWTH, 1980 TO 2000

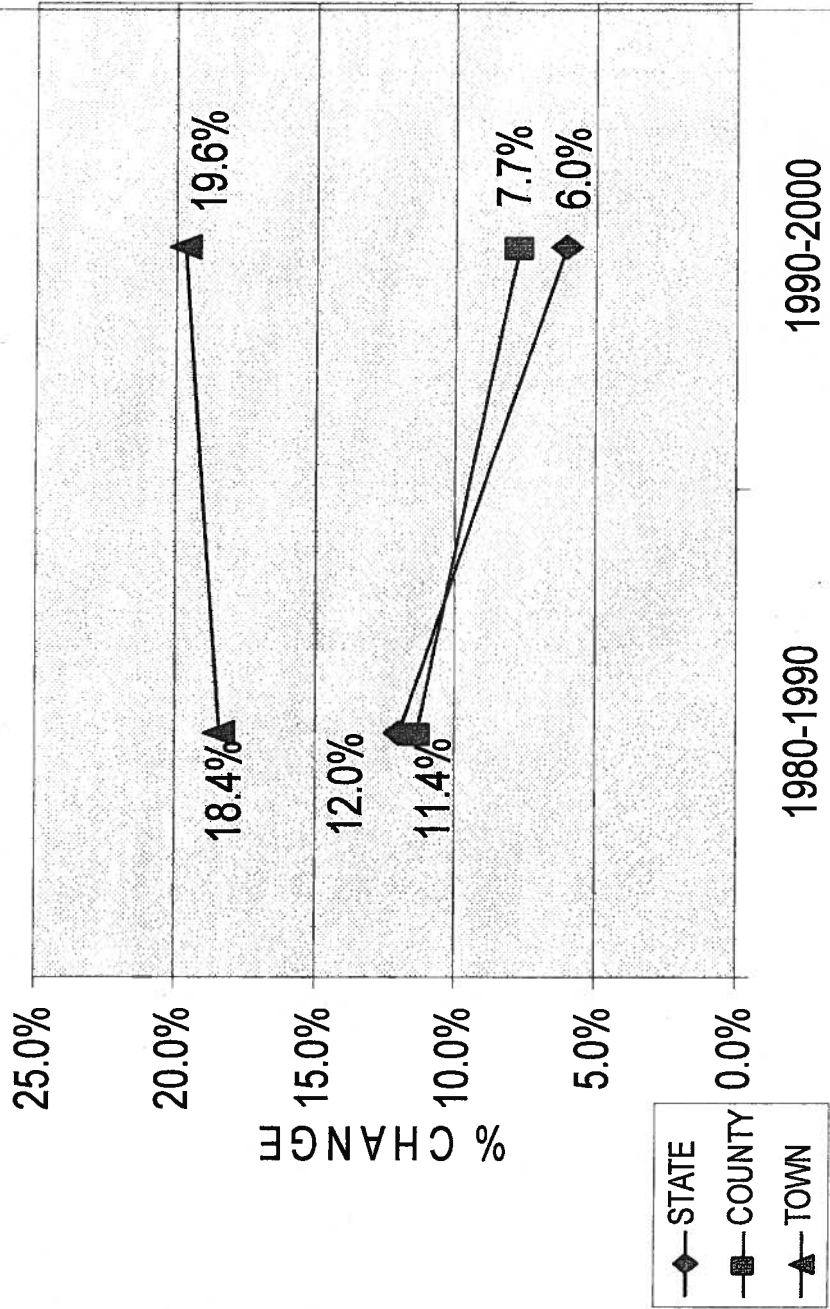

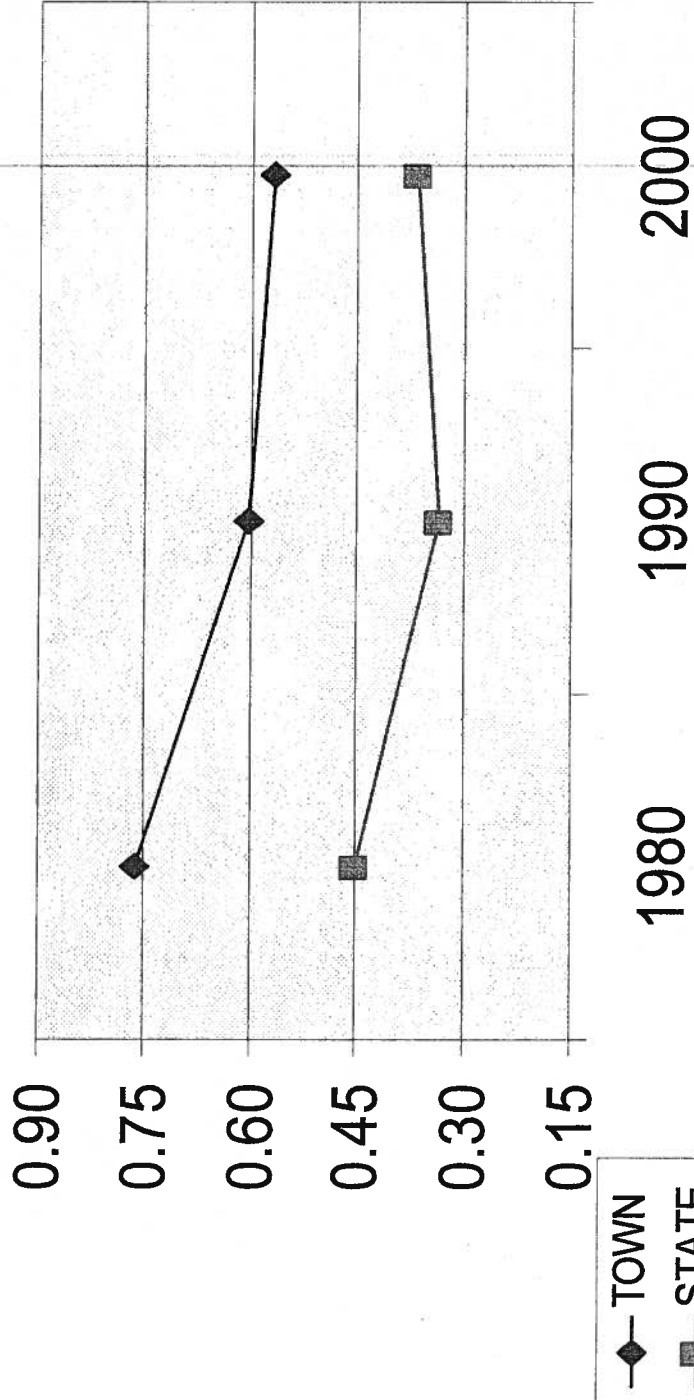

PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS PER DWELLING UNIT

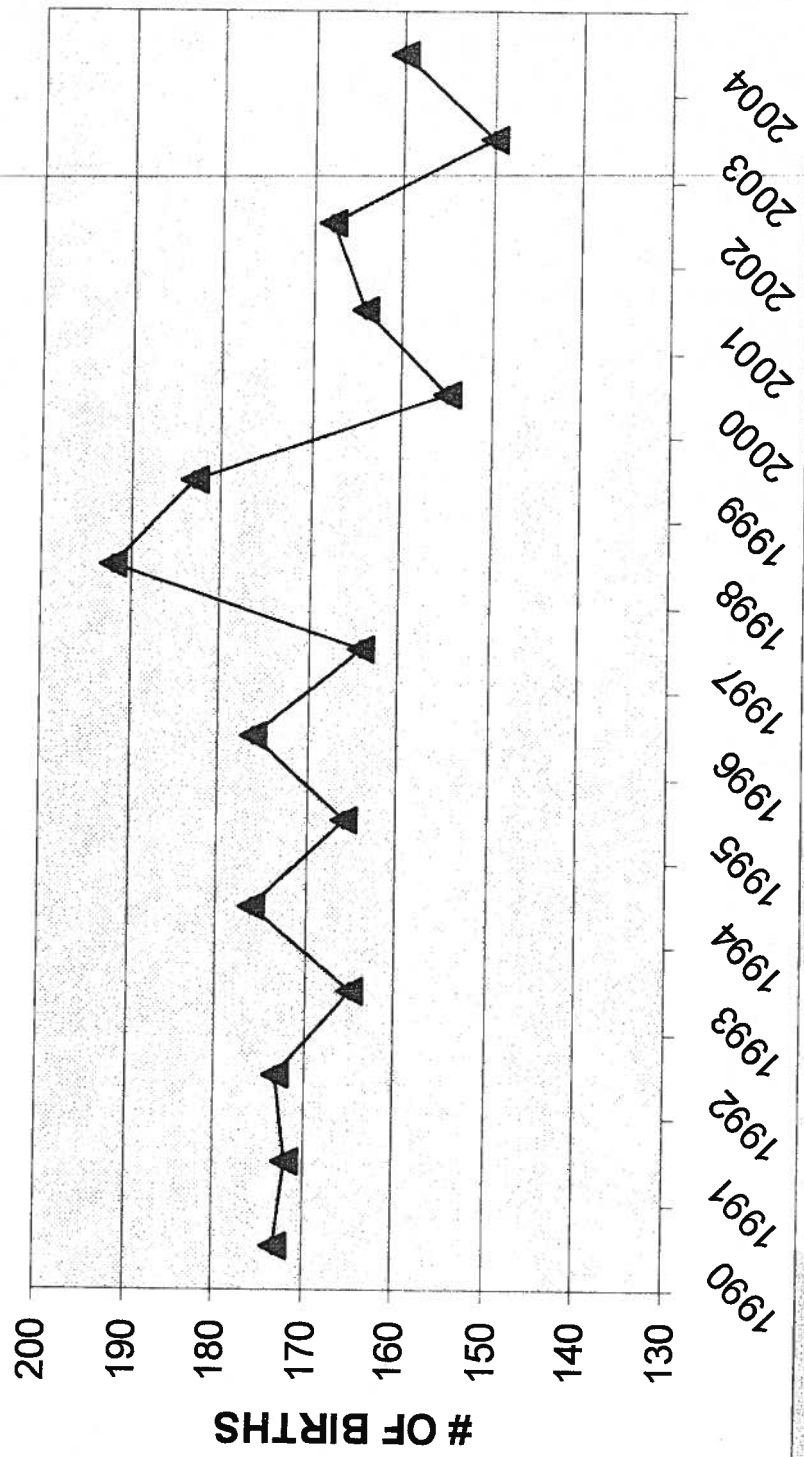

BIRTHS TO RESIDENTS OF EAST BRIDGEWATER



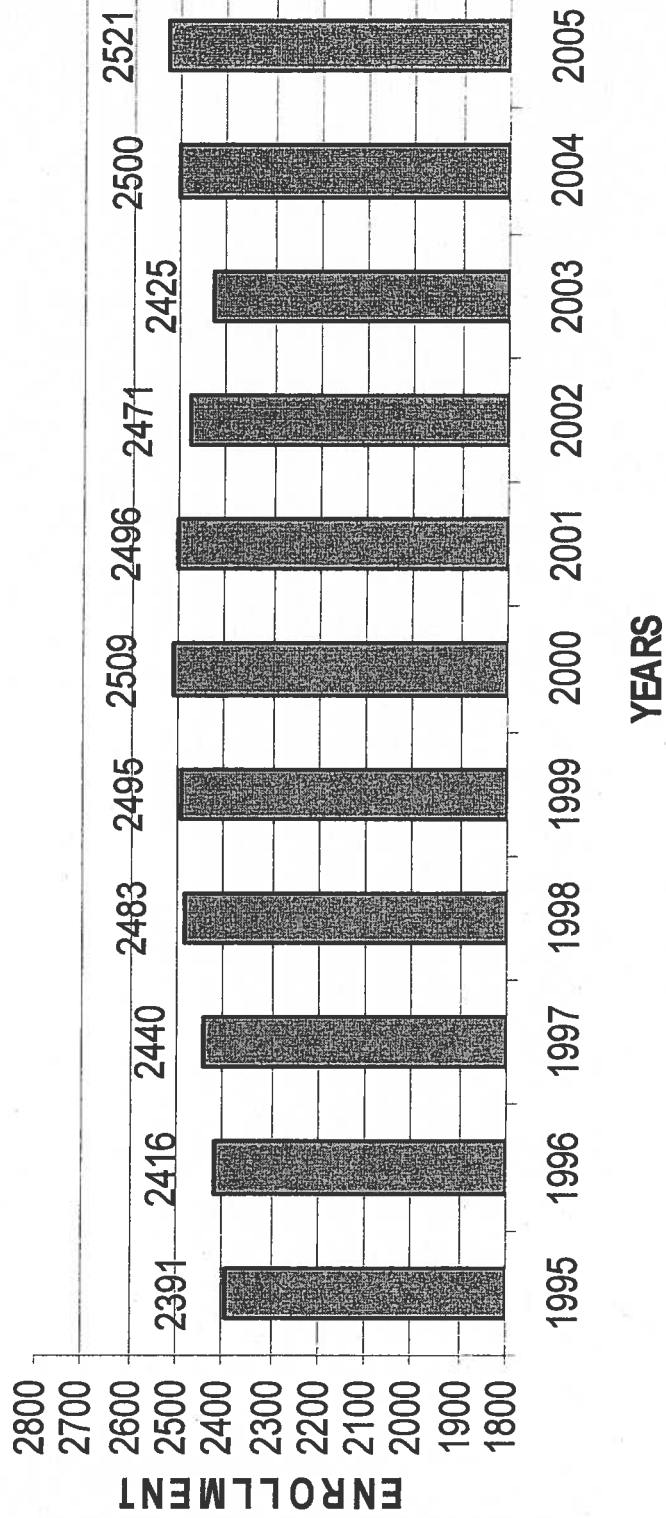

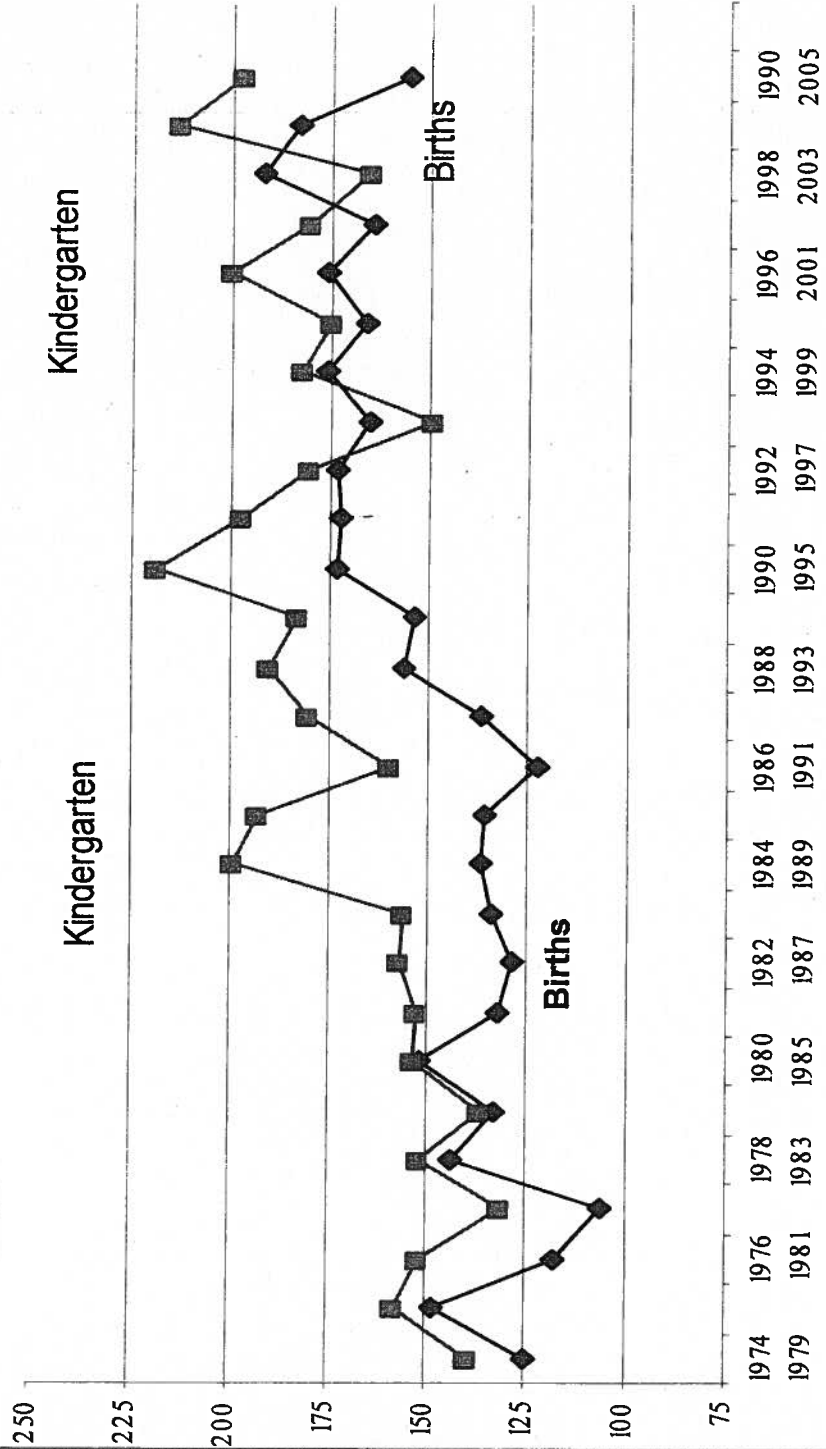
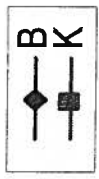

EAST BRIDGEWATER BIRTH-TO-KINDERGARTEN RELATIONSHIP



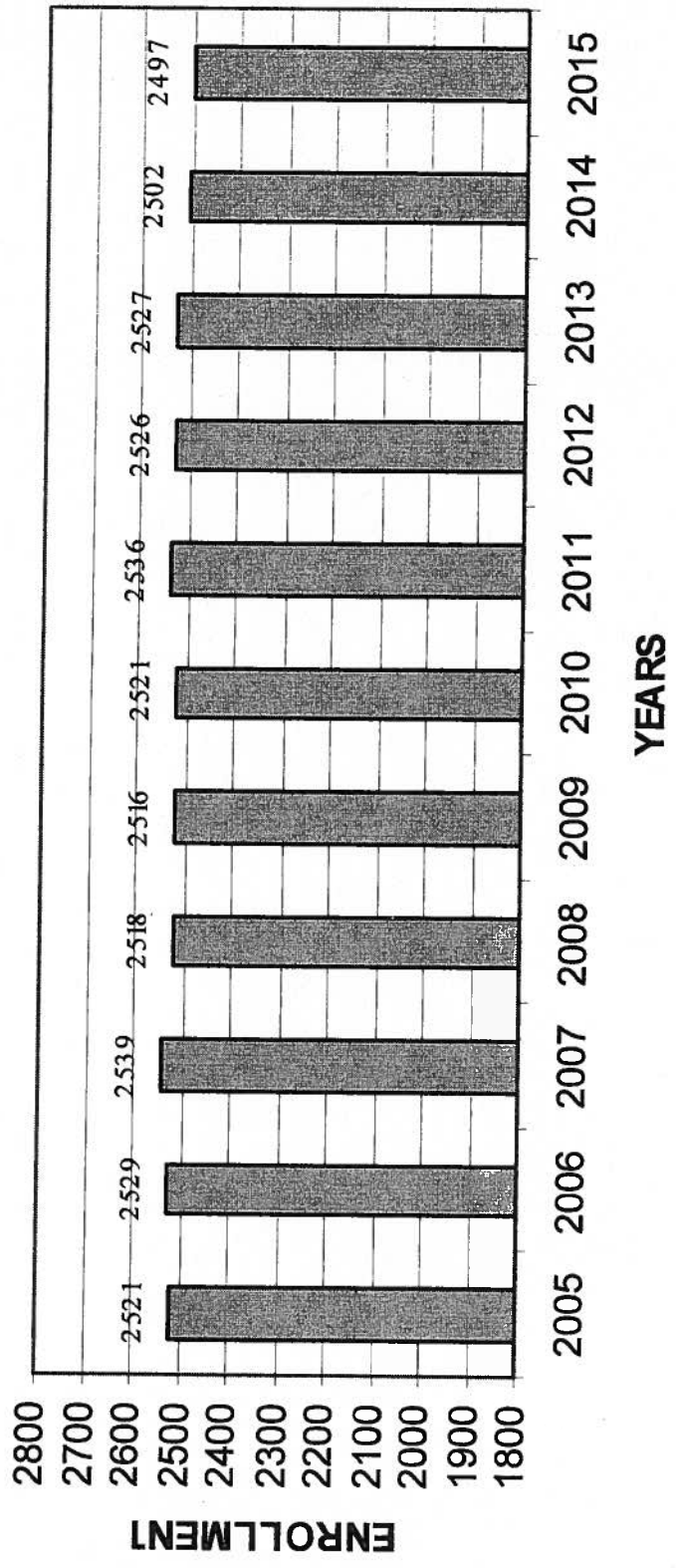

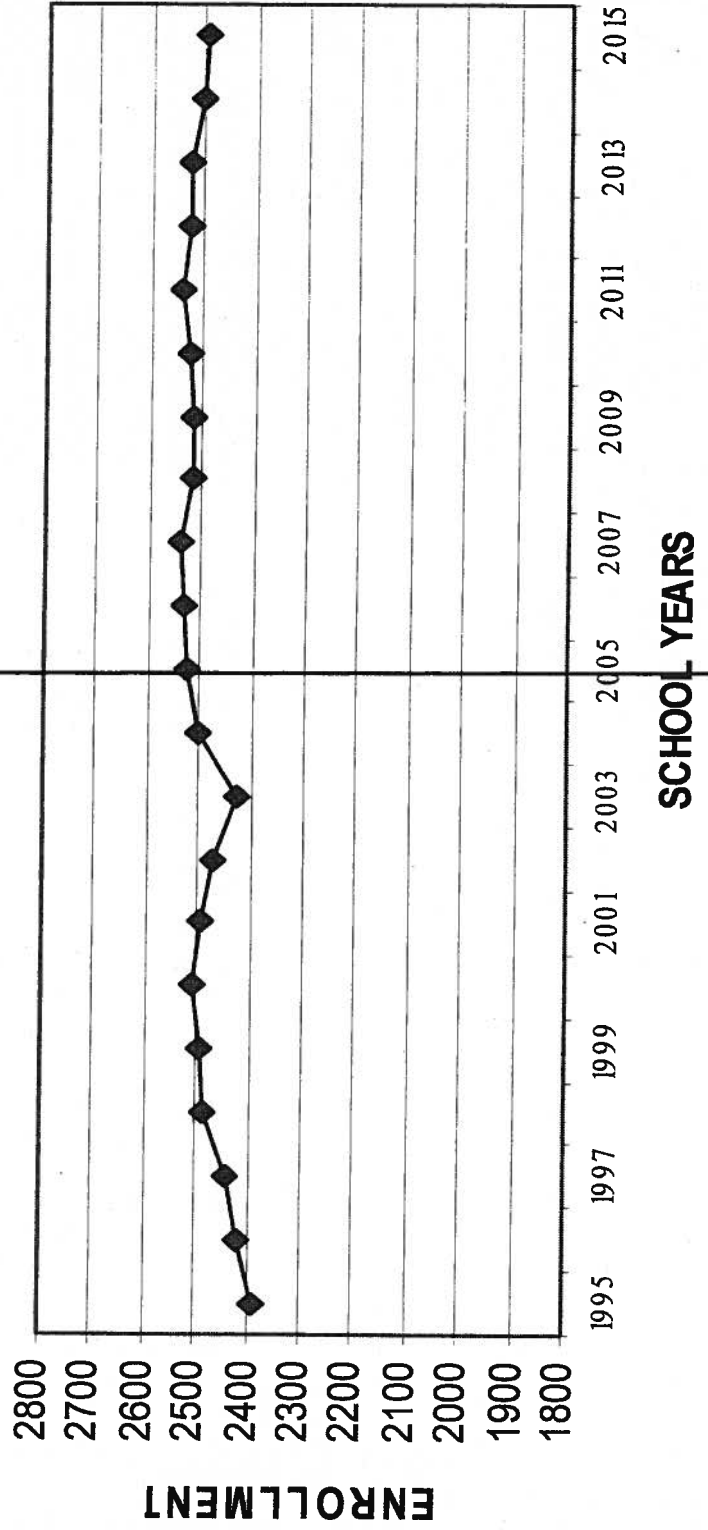
**PROJECTED Pre-K-12 ENROLLMENT THROUGH 2015 BASED ON DATA

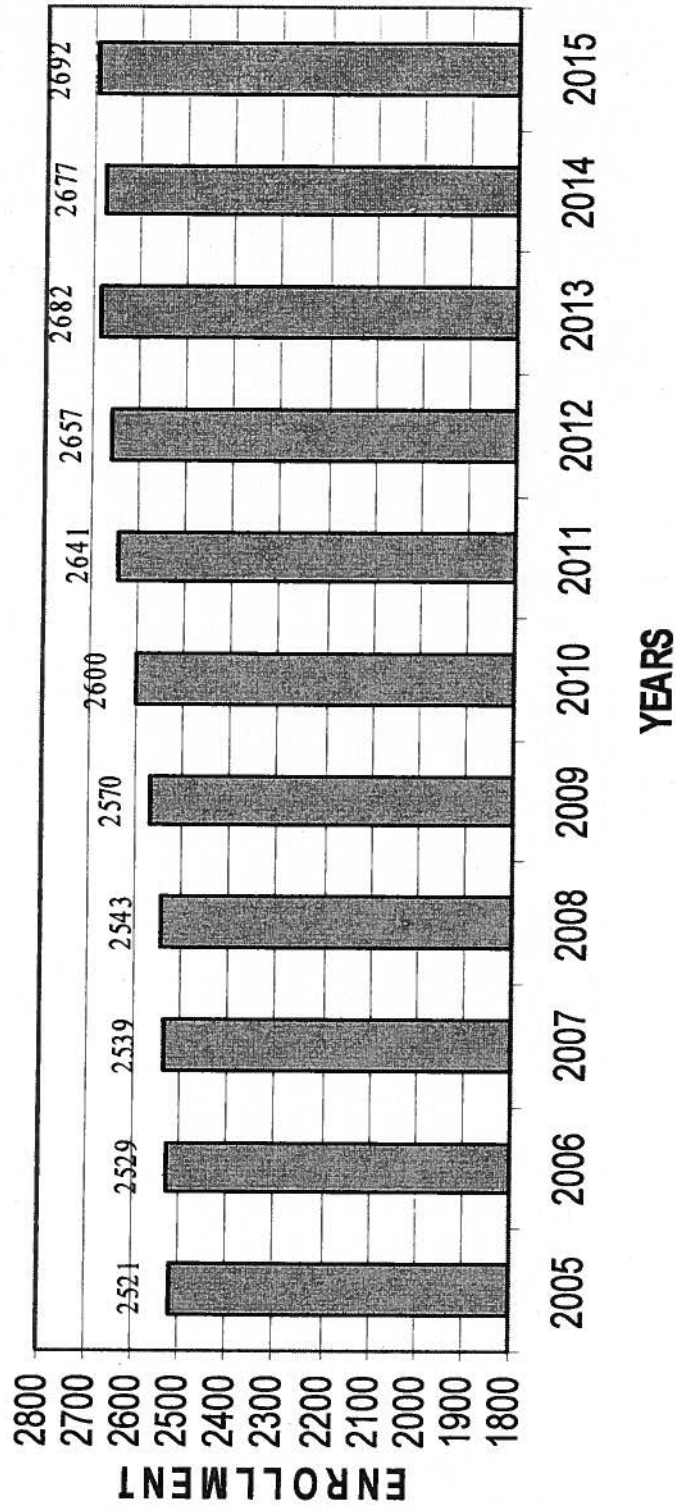

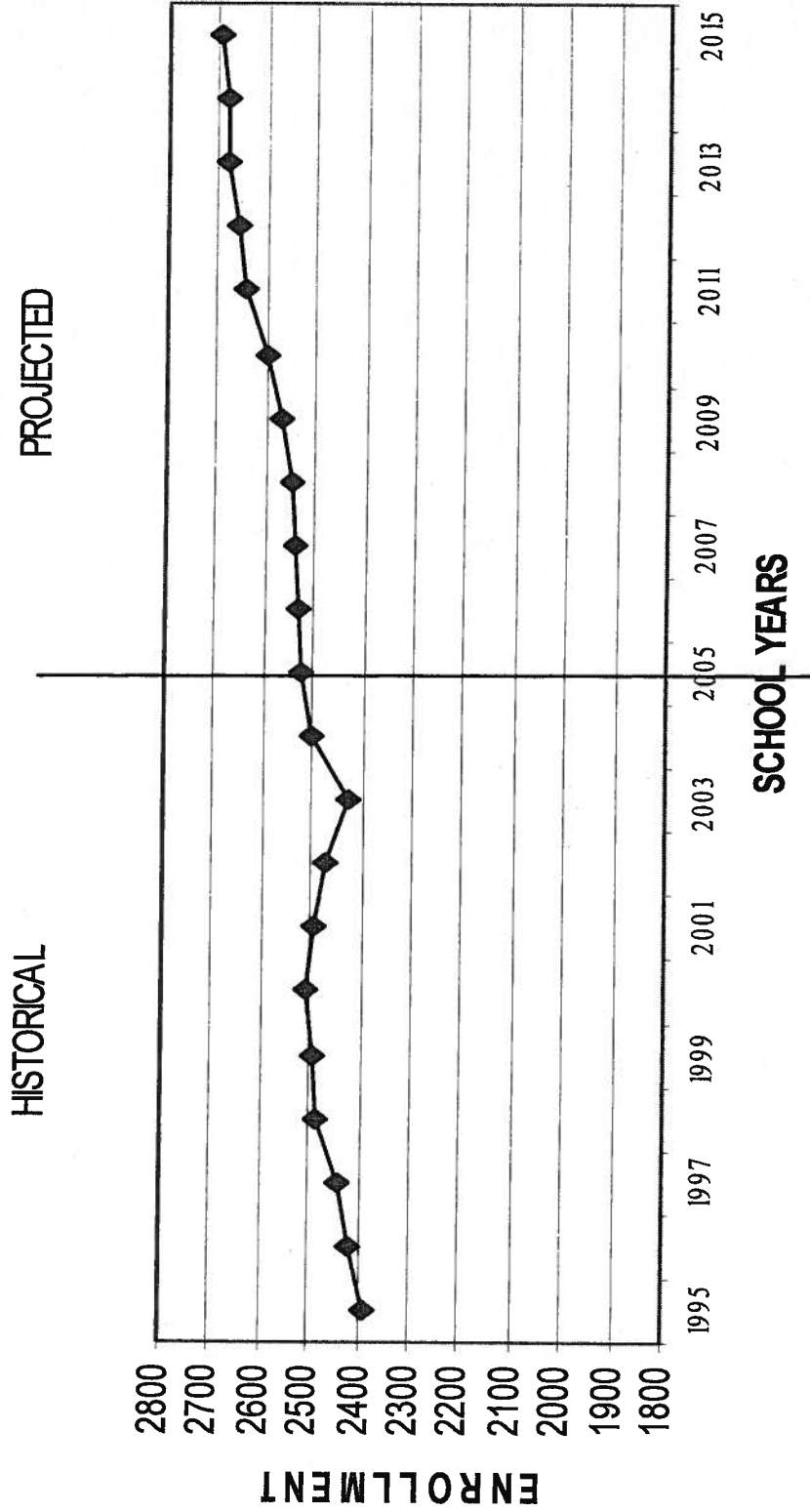

EXISTING SYSTEM

- Appears to be a single system, serving both schools.
- The drawings reviewed were dated July 18, 1973.
- The system is actually an under drain sand filter tied to the storm water drainage system.
- I spoke to Frank Mezzacappa of DEP regarding history of site. This area has poor soils with better soils to the North. An expansion of the school or reconstruction will require a sewage discharge permit which does not tie to surface drainage runoff.
- In addition, the entire site is in a Zone II Aquifer Protection Area. (See attached plan)

SOILS

See attached soil map. Note that the northerly side near the existing road is supposed to be sand and gravel. DEP as well as Soil Conservation Services (SCS) say they believe this is true. The proposed leach area (after treatment) would require about 6000 sqft leach area with 6000 for reserve (if soil is really sand and gravel).

I sketched a possible area out front of the existing school for now. May or may not workout. Soils **must** be good sands/gravel not compact stratified soils with groundwater reasonably deep. I am concerned when I see a row of catch basins on the northeast side of the 1973 site plan. Is there a high groundwater problem? Why all the catch basins?

OPINION: Dig some preliminary test pits in front of the existing school and see if we can find suitable depths of high yield sands and gravel.

It should be noted that the Gordon W. Mitchell Middle School down the street (School #3) built a new septic system in May 1994. The percolation rate recorded was less than 2 min/inch. They are in the same high yield sand and gravel aquifer that the High School/Elementary School is in.

OPINION: Promising, **but** on site testing critical. If it can't be found on the High School/Elementary School site maybe there are areas available off site. Hopefully, you won't have to go off site.

As far as locating a Wastewater Treatment Plant it would appear, at this time w/o a visit to site, to locate it somewhere in the lower area of the site so that the High/Elem School which flow by gravity to this area now could be diverted easily to the new WWTP. How about tying the Town Hall and Water Dept. Buildings in as well, if not already tied in? We would review the site to be sure we are not near wetlands, etc. I was thinking maybe down near the Fire Dept. Building. However that is very very preliminary.

SITE CONSTRAINTS (ATTACHED GIS MAPS ANNOTATED)

1. Salisbury Plain River flows through property from the south. Site impact by "Rivers Act".
2. Beaver Brook enters site from north. (Rivers Act). Join and leave site to southeast.
3. Land elevation, relatively flat.
4. Soil maps indicate fine grain soils, these normally produce slow to poor percolation.
5. On site test (by others) indicate high groundwater.

OPINION:

The site is impacted by a River and at least two streams. The soil maps indicate the soils will be tight fine grain deposit with marginal to poor percolation. Typically for soils of this type "mound" effect from discharging 18,000 gals of treated waste will be high. Couple this with a flat gradient and you will require significant filling in order to obtain the required separation from bottom of leach field to the mounded groundwater elevation.

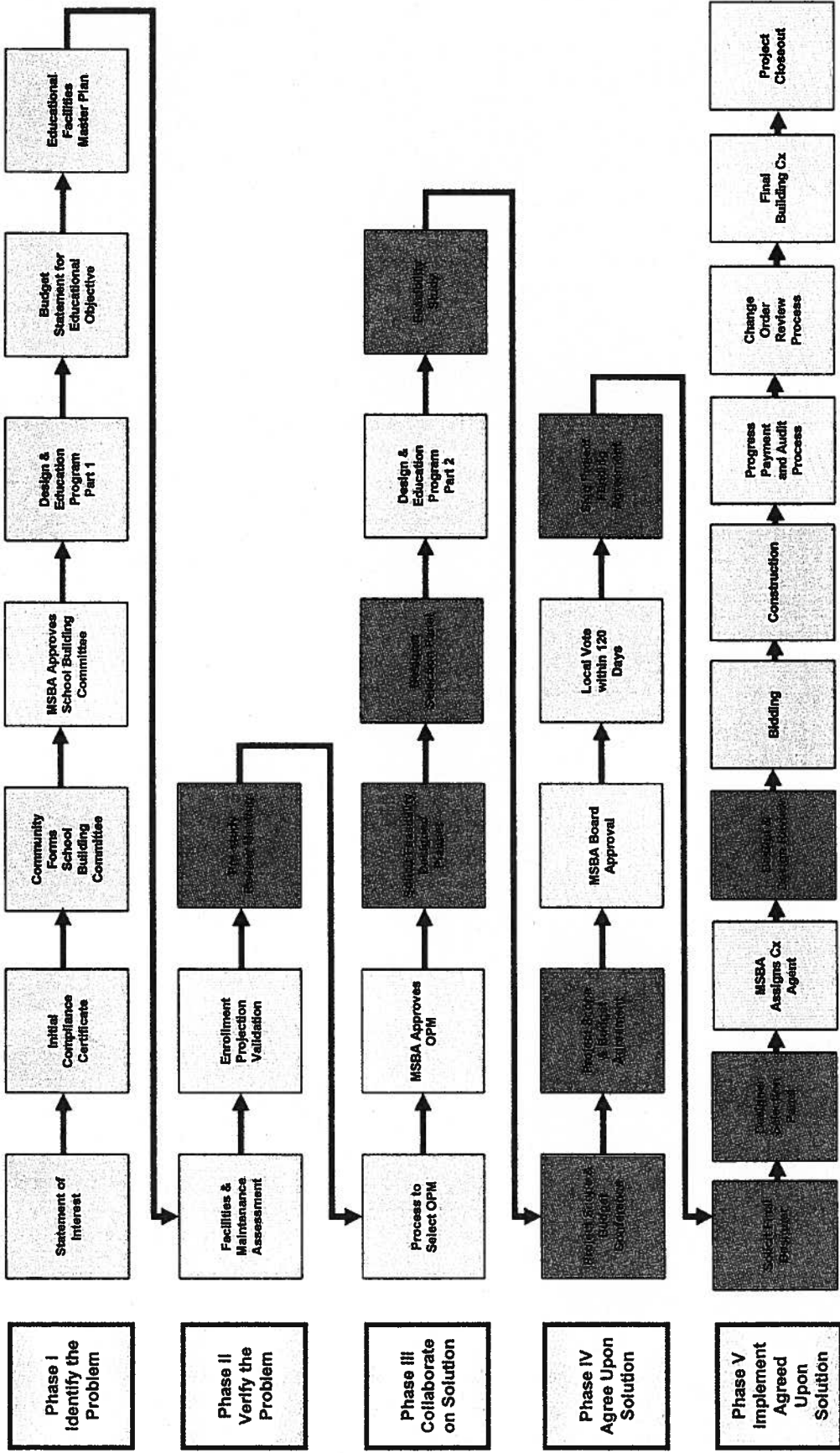

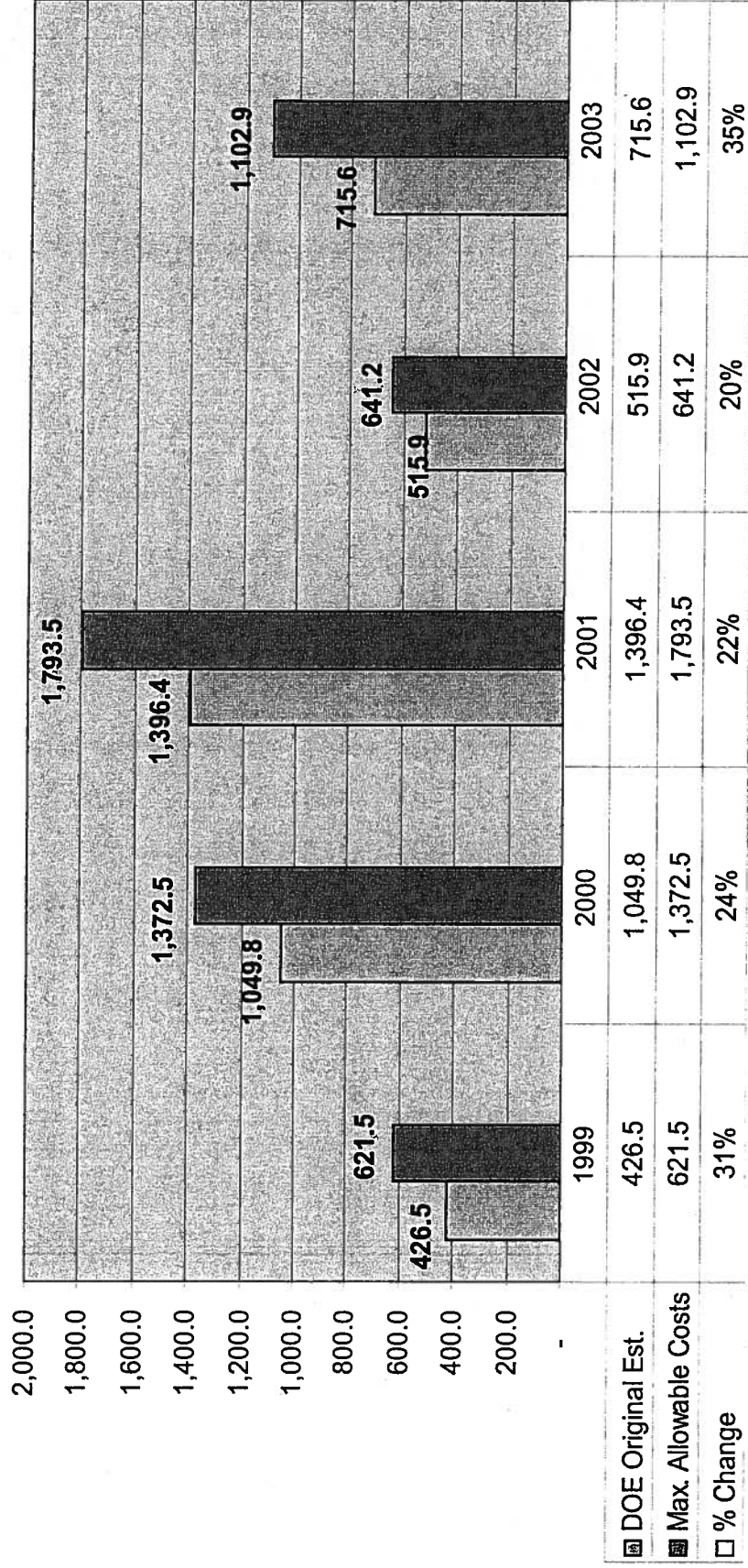

The Massachusetts School Building Authority

- Chapter 208 of the Acts of 2004 created an independent public Authority and ended the former School Building Assistance Program operated by the Department of Education.
- The Authority is charged with:
 - Succeeding to the powers of the Department of Education, inheriting over \$11B in outstanding payments for 1156 projects authorized under the old SBA program
 - Achieving the effective management, planning and financial sustainability of the school building assistance program;
 - Revising regulations for a new program of grants for school construction projects subject to the availability of funds and a statutory cap, beginning in FY08

Waiting List Projects: DOE Original Estimates vs. Maximum Allowable Costs

In every year since 1999 the maximum cost allowed by DOE for any given project far exceeded what DOE originally estimated to be the cost of a project – on average costs exceeded original estimates by almost 26%



Grant Conversion and Loan Programs for Waiting List Projects

- Of the 428 projects on the Waiting List, a small portion who have delayed construction have experienced significant cost pressures.
- To address these cost pressures the MSBA has
 - Added over \$1.4 Billion to the Waiting List for construction inflation
 - Created a One-time Loan Program
 - Created a One-time Grant Conversion Program
- Creation of these one-time programs and the addition of the \$1.4 Billion for inflation have provided communities with a no-cost or low-cost way to address the cost pressures and complete their Waiting List projects.

Loan Program for Waiting List Projects

- The Loan Program is a time-limited offer to extend a Loan to certain eligible Waiting List projects.
- The Loan pool is capped at \$150M. All \$150M has been applied for by eligible Waiting List communities.
- The intent of the Loan Program is to assist a community with a portion of the eligible project costs that exceed the Maximum Allowable Cost (MAC) for which a community has no further option to address these additional costs.
- The general terms of the Loan are up to 25 years at 2% on a level principal amortization schedule (if issued as a Qualified Bond under M.G.L. 44A, up to 30 years at 2% on a level principal amortization schedule).
- To receive funds, a community must have
 - submitted all required audit materials from previous school projects
 - signed a Project Funding Agreement with the MSBA for all projects on the Waiting List that are not finished with construction
 - submitted an Loan application, received a Loan Approval letter and agree to execute the appropriate Loan Contracts and Documents with the MSBA

Grant Conversion Program for Waiting List Projects

- The Grant Conversion Program is a time-limited offer to allow certain communities with multiple Waiting List projects the ability to remove a project(s) and use a portion of the grant on another Waiting List project.
- The intent of the Grant Conversion Program is to assist a community in completing feasible Waiting List projects by using estimated grants from other Waiting List projects within that community that were not viable.
- A Grant conversion would be for a portion of the eligible project costs that exceed the Maximum Allowable Cost (MAC) for which a community has no further option to address these additional costs.
- To receive funds a community must have
 - submitted all required audit materials from previous school projects
 - signed a Project Funding Agreement with the MSBA for all projects on the Waiting List that are not finished with construction
 - submitted a Grant Conversion application and a Declaration of Intent to Remove a Project from the Waiting List, received a Confirmation of their Declaration.

First 2 Years: Significant Progress Made

Authority's accomplishments to date:

- Made over \$4.1B in payments to cities, towns, and regional school districts
- Almost all completed Wait List projects have received a payment to date,
 - 225 projects have been audited, closed out and completely paid off
 - 100 have competed audits and are pending board approval
 - 38 are being reimbursed under the progress payment system
 - 32 projects are permanently financed and are receiving an annual payment
- Completed first ever capital survey of 1,817 schools in the Commonwealth
- Completed most comprehensive revision of program regulations in 60 years
- Developed and implemented a Progress Payment System for projects under construction
- Cities and towns have saved millions of dollars in interest costs related to school construction
- More efficient financing through the Authority has freed up over \$1B in municipal resources which otherwise would have been issued for school construction

Needs Survey Results

The condition of the 1,817 Massachusetts schools is generally good

- Over 76% rated in generally good condition
- Only 3%, or 62 schools, rated in need of substantial work
- There was little correlation between the relative wealth of a school district and the general condition of the school buildings within that district

Massachusetts has expended a substantial amount on schoolhouse capital facilities over the past 60 years

- Of the 1,817 schools in the Commonwealth, 1,156, or 63%, are currently being reimbursed for construction or renovation projects undertaken between 1986 and 2005 with an approximate MSBA cost of \$11 billion
- The Commonwealth was paying an average of 72% of local capital school construction or renovation costs

Almost one-half of the current school facility square footage is new or recently renovated

Massachusetts schools have been built 32% to 39% larger, on average, than the maximum gross square footage space requirements per student in the Department of Education regulations

Goals of New MSBA Regulations

- Authority involvement in process from initial description of problem through project approval, construction and completion
- Create a low cost application process for municipalities until Authority approves a project
- Develop a process that lives within the Authority's statutory cap for school construction grants

What is new?

- The process begins with local determination of a problem, not a solution, as articulated by the community in the Statement of Interest

- Sliding scale for school sizes based upon enrollment
 - New size standards more sensitive to actual building layouts
- Quicker Payments: “Pay as you Build”: Approved projects will not wait indefinitely for state funding
- Approval for Authority funding based upon local need in the context of statewide evaluation and statutory criteria, not self-determined need
- Project scope will be defined by collaborative process between the Municipality and the Authority

What is new?

- Encourages central decision making by authorized person at the municipal level

- Focus on maintenance: statutory requirements will be adhered to and the Authority will provide Maintenance Trust Fund match to eligible communities

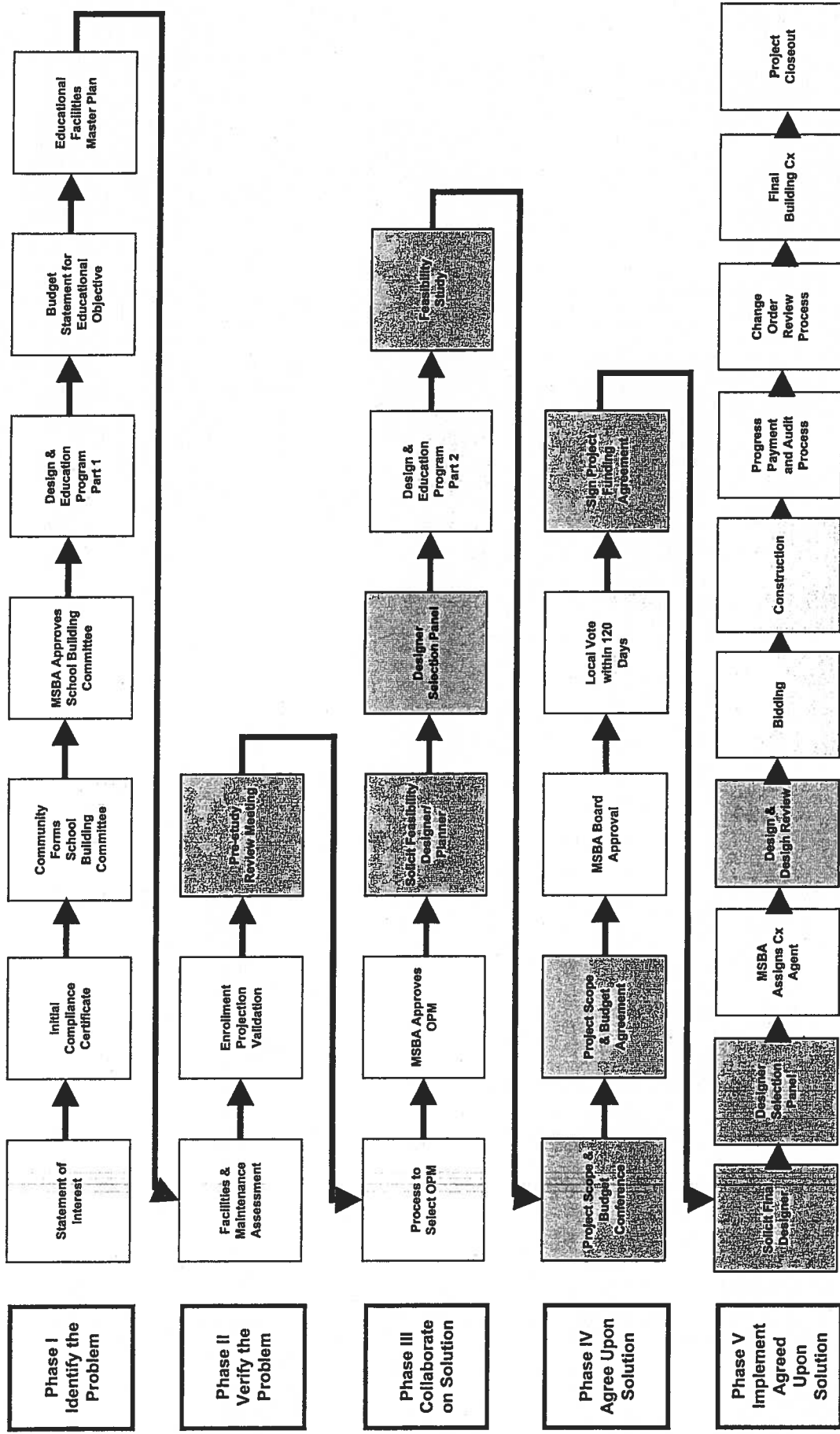
What is the Same?

- State review of expenditures, designs and insistence on complete documentation
- Ineligible costs of old program remain ineligible: site procurement, district administrative space, costs over agreed upon budget, field houses, swimming pools, ice rinks
- Special Education exceptions will still be considered if District demonstrates that size standards are inadequate
- Process of building a school is not longer or shorter because of new regulations—Authority is just involved earlier
- Long range master planning still required at District level
- Suspension of payments for failure to submit required information, reclaim the depreciated costs of closed school
- 50 year anticipated useful life for a school building

The New Process Overview

- 1. Identify the Problem**
 - Local community identifies deficiencies in school facilities through the Statement of Interest process
- 2. Validate the Problem**
 - MSBA and local community work together to validate deficiencies identified

Facilities and Maintenance Assessments

- Initial Pilot anticipated to start by end of March
- MSBA will schedule with the district
- Mission: Standard assessment to validate conditions identified in Statement of Interest
 - If the problem is validated, the assessment will help identify factors for a Feasibility study

The New Application Process

- The new application process will require the MSBA and the city, town or regional school district to first agree on the problem
- Then MSBA and city, town or regional school district will work collaboratively on creating a solution
- Solution must fit within the MSBA's available funding, long-term capital plan and will be prioritized based on the priorities established in section 8 C.70B
- The new process will require that the MSBA and the city, town or regional school district work in conjunction through **all stages** of a project
- The statute which created the MSBA places tremendous emphasis on planning, due diligence and prioritization of scarce Authority resources

New Application Process

- Feasibility Study benchmarks will be reviewed locally and at MSBA
- If MSBA can financially give the “green light” for a project, the Community and MSBA will agree upon scope, budget, and time frame for project. Minimum Reimbursement Rate will be allocated to community at this time by MSBA.
- Community needs to get local support for local share of financing, MSBA will give time limited commitment to Community for certain reimbursement amount from MSBA for agreed upon project

Intensive Pre-Design Planning Process Yields Better Results

- Goal: Feasibility Studies should be informed by educational goals, available operating resources to achieve those goals, realistic enrollments, realistic site assessments.
